DID YOU KNOW?

Cell phones have become an integral part of our society over the past few decades. The growth and popularity of these miniature wonders has led to an explosion in technological advances. This often necessitates the need to upgrade on a regular basis. On average most Americans change phones every 18 months. The question then becomes - **“What do I do with my old cell phone?”** Here are some ideas for your outdated cell phones.

- **Give it away.** Many times our old phones are still functional and may still be viable for someone who is in need.
- **Sell it.** Some retailers and recyclers will actually pay you for your old phones. In some cases they don't even need to be working.
- **Recycle it.** There are many reasons for recycling your old phone. One reason is that cell phones contain precious metals such as gold, silver, palladium and copper, all of which can be mined from cell phones.

Remember – **never throw cell phones in the garbage!** Lithium-ion batteries pose a significant risk to solid waste workers as the batteries frequently start fires. Additionally, some chemicals in cell phones, when placed in landfills, may leach into groundwater and poison water in surrounding areas.

It is estimated that there are **153,000 cell phones in Tehama County.** That's a lot of cell phones! Working together we can keep the phones out of our landfill and continue to keep Tehama County beautiful.
